From darkness, lead me to light."





Iran's Unfinished Revolution - Echoes of Change Across Time

"Chin-ha-ye ma ra beshkanim!"

We will break all the chains!

The slogan rumbled throughout Tehran's streets in 1979—the landmark year that saw an autocracy overturned.

The 1979 Iranian Revolution marked the end of a 2,500-year monarchy and was replaced by an Islamic Republic. This change, initially a beacon of hope, later sparked mass revolts and struggles that still ripple through Iran today.

Like most revolutions, the Iranian Revolution stemmed from widespread vehemence within the commoners of the nation. Driven by discontent with Western influence, political oppression, socio-economic disparities, and religious fervor, the revolution was a seismic shift—socially, politically, and culturally. Its echoes resonate in modern Iran, where people still fight for freedom, proving that change is never silent.

The seeds of the 1979 revolution were sown through the emergence of the former leader of Iran, Reza Shah Pahlavi, as the head of state. His path back to power was paved by a CIA-backed coup in 1953, and his policies displayed apparent alignment with American interests thereafter. Through reforms such as the 'White Revolution', Iran was modernized, but many saw this as an attack on the traditional Iranian identity and an adoption of Western culture.

Politically, the Shah's regime was suffocating. His secret police, SAVAK, arrested and tortured dissenters, from students to clerics. Censorship silenced voices, but whispers of rebellion grew louder. Economically, rapid urbanization created stark divides. While Tehran's elites flaunted wealth, rural farmers and urban workers struggled with unemployment and rising costs. "The Shah lives in a palace, but we can't afford bread," a protester once recounted.

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However, it was religion that became the spark. Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, exiled for criticizing the Shah, smuggled sermons into Iran on cassette tapes. His vision of an Islamic government united diverse groups—secular intellectuals, communists, and devout Muslims—against a common enemy. By 1978, protests swelled, strikes paralyzed the economy, and the Shah's grip faltered. The stage was set for revolution.

In January 1979, the Shah fled Iran after the 1978 Black Friday massacre, where troops killed dozens of protesters. Just weeks later, Khomeini returned to a hero's welcome. Millions cheered as the monarchy crumbled. But the joy was short-lived.

"We found ourselves veiled and separated from our friends." – Persepolis

The new regime empowered certain marginalized groups, like rural communities, who gained a voice in the Islamic Republic. But women, who had marched alongside men in protests, faced a jarring shift. By 1983, mandatory hijab laws and gender segregation reshaped daily life. Censorship banned pop music and films, stifling creativity. Iran was again ruled by a repressive regime. Authoritarianism was back.

The 1979 Revolution was a cry for sovereignty and justice, but its aftermath shows that change is complex. It ended foreign dominance but birthed new struggles. Today's protests carry the same hunger for freedom, echoing across generations.

The 2022–2023 protests, sparked by Mahsa Amini's death in custody for "improper" hijab, saw women and students lead the charge. Chanting "Woman, Life, Freedom," they used social media to dodge state censorship, posting defiant messages like, "We are not afraid, we are together." Alongside Amini's case, anger over prohibition, Sharia law, economic hardship, and moral policing has driven mass turmoil, echoing 1979's call for justice.

In the words of Heraclitus, "The only constant in life is change."

The Iranian Revolution shattered chains but forged new ones. Rooted in oppression, inequality, and cultural clashes, it transformed Iran's social, political, and cultural fabric. Its impacts resonate in today's unrest. Tehran's streets are alive with chants, carrying 1979's defiance into 2025.


Let's rewind to a medical disaster that rocked the world: the infamous lobotomy procedures. In the mid-20th century, physicians performed lobotomies—a procedure that involved slicing connections in the brain in the name of treating mental illness. Sound wild? Well, it was. Thousands of patients, many of them perfectly healthy, were subjected to this barbaric practice—all in the name of "treatment." The law at the time supported it. But was it right?

Then enter rebels—doctors, patients, and activists—who violated the law in their own ways to expose the horrors happening. Parks became an icon of civil disobedience, an individual who bravely challenged an unjust system.

See how breaking a law is the stepping stone for change. History has shown that legality does not always equate to morality. From the horrors of lobotomies to the fight against-segregation, change has often come from those willing to defy unjust laws. These acts of defiance are not mere rebellions—they are the catalysts that challenge outdated systems and redefine justice. As society continues to evolve, it is crucial to question, challenge, and, when necessary, resist laws that uphold injustice. 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An Immigrant Socialist Who Could Lead NYC: Zohran Mamdani's Radical Vision

Every four years, New York City prepares for its leadership race, following the presidential elections. But this year, the usual political rhythm has been interrupted by something far more urgent and exhilarating. A man with a plan to cut through the city's cacophony of inequality and to give rise to a community that embodies utter financial tranquilly. That man is Zohran Mamdani.


So, who exactly is this bold figure being accentuated across every borough? He is a proud immigrant, a former rapper, a democratic socialist, and potentially, the first Muslim and Indian American mayor of New York City. But more than his identity, it is his message that is capturing imaginations. He is the architect of Zohranomics — a people-first vision rooted in radical empathy, affordability, and social equity.

Zohranomics: A Blueprint to Ameliorate Life in NYC

At the core of Mamdani's vision is one simple word — affordable. This singular idea is built to lift financial burdens off working class and low-income families and to ameliorate the daily struggles that have made living in New York nearly unendurable for so many.

He aims to raise the city's wage floor to thirty dollars an hour by the year 2030. It is a bold proposal, but one that would definitely uplift a myriad of individuals from poverty, nourish economic growth, and close the city's deep income gap.

On housing, he intends to freeze rent for residents in rent-stabilized units and construct two hundred thousand new publicly funded, union-built homes. These homes would not only be cost effective, but



also more secure and dignified. Mamdani also vows to elevate the issue of deed theft in vulnerable neighborhoods and to fix a property tax system that disproportionately favors the wealthy.

Additionally, a simple yet revolutionary idea of city-owned grocery stores. By eliminating rent and property taxes, these stores could offer food at wholesale prices, easing the grocery burden for families who struggle every week to put meals on the table.

Public transit would also be modified. Mamdani promises permanent fare-free buses and quicker routes through dedicated lanes. In his vision, the city becomes more serene and more unified. Not just in transport, but in spirit. And this is only the beginning. His plans also include no-cost childcare, higher taxes for corporations and the top one percent, the creation of a new Department of Community Safety focused on care rather than force, and securing immigrants and LGBTQIA communities. In a way he calls "Trump-proofing" the city.

The People's Politician: From Kampala to Queens to City Hall?

Born in Kampala, Uganda to Indian filmmaker Mira Nair and acclaimed academic Mahmood Mamdani, Zohran moved to New York at the age of just seven. Before stepping into politics, he performed under the name Young Cardamom, blending music with activism. But what truly

distinguishes him is not his story, but his way of connecting with others.

His campaign thrives at the grassroots. No lavish fundraisers. Hardly any corporate donors. Just conversations in corner stores, school gymnasiums, and community parks. He strolls the streets of Queens and Brooklyn not as a distant politician, but as a neighbor. His social media is filled with calm, clear explanations of complex policies. His tone remains honest and grounded, even in the most chaotic political moments.

There is a contentment to the way he speaks about justice, and earnestness to the hope he brings.

A Reckoning or a Revolution?



They question whether state approval will hinder much of what he promises. And the word "socialist" continues to spark fear in wealthy and conservative circles. Yet for many New Yorkers, precisely renters, students, immigrants, artists, and dreamers, Mamdani feels like the first politician in a long time who genuinely sees them. Not as voters, but as people. He represents the possibility of a calmer, fairer, more balanced city.

A place where the daily struggle is not romanticized, but relieved. A place where the raucous voices of inequality finally gives way to something more relived.

So now the question remains. Will Zohran Mamdani be the one to transform this city's mayhem to solace? Will his reassuring kindness and focused vision turn into real change? Or will New York prove, once again, that even the Big Apple cannot bite off more than it can chew?

 - Life on Land (15)
- Organized a food drive for an orphanage with over 100 donations, helping around 200 children
- Recycled over 75 kg of paper
- Planted over 100 trees
- Raised over 40,000 INR
- Initiated Project Ignite—an initiative to tutor and sponsor the education of underprivileged children
- Started The Merida Initiative—teaching selfdefense to vulnerable children and young girls

Through these initiatives, Malachite has helped more than 500 individuals and has established a path for future generations to help revolutionize society. It only takes the ambition of a few to fuel change. If a few ordinary high schoolers can, so can you.



The Evolution of AI

Introduction

As time passes and the future draws closer, technology advances further, reshaping our lives. In our current timeline, artificial intelligence (AI) is a rapidly evolving element of technology. This powerful tool is changing how we do things, from simple tasks to big discoveries. Machines that can learn and adapt are no longer just a fragment of a child's imagination; they are being used and implemented everywhere.

You can find them in hospitals where AI helps doctors find sickness sooner; in schools, where AI makes learning new things easier; and you can even find them in our homes, where it is behind the voices that answer our questions. The sudden advancement of AI has opened up many opportunities. It serves as an effective tool for humans to finish tasks. As a matter of fact, about 55 percent of organizations have adopted AI to varying degrees. The ability of AI to quickly analyze vast amounts of data and convert its findings into organized visual formats has proven to be highly convenient for these organizations. Instead of spending endless hours parsing through these massive amounts of data manually, people are starting to save major time by asking AI to do it for them.

Echoes of Change

The influence of AI extends beyond its present-day applications, sending echoes of change throughout society. These advancements do not just cause temporary change; they resonate across time, reshaping how we live and work in ways that continue to unfold. For instance, the efficiency gained in the various examples throughout society reflects a positive shift in productivity. For example, AI automation has streamlined production processes, and, for many, has made accessing relevant information and learning much simpler. This enhances convenience and allows individuals to complete their tasks quickly while maintaining high quality. However, this prompts the question: is a speed and efficient focused lifestyle necessary? Will there ever be a point where the efficiency is adequate?

Though AI presents substantial benefits, change is not always positive. These echoes also carry doubt towards ethics, welfare, and growth. Ethically, AI's reliance on datasets raises concerns about privacy and fairness. For instance, AI systems used in hiring may assess only quantitative aspects and unintentionally favor certain groups, leading to unfair outcomes. In other words, it may determine that a person with more years of experience is better than a person with fewer years of experience, disregarding the quality of the experience itself. From a welfare perspective, automation can reduce jobs in fields like retail by requiring training programs to help workers adapt to new roles. This presents economic challenges, as the supply of jobs may fail to meet demand. Additionally, the energy demands of advanced AI systems raise questions about environmental sustainability. It is reported that "A mid-sized data center uses about 300,000 gallons of water per day for cooling, roughly equivalent to the water use of 1,000 homes" (The Joyce Foundation). So, although AI generates positive echoes of change, these echoes also reverberate with negative consequences throughout society. In order to combat this, society as a whole must set ethical guidelines to prevent AI from feeding on our obsession with an "efficient life". Though it may sound alluring, cutting down on time spent may not always mean wasteful time. It may also mean cutting down experiences, such as the experience of finally finding what you were scrounging through the Internet for. It may take away pieces of life that were taken for granted and lead to a tedious lifestyle instead.

The Business of Learning: How Profit is Reshaping Indian Education

Education inflation in India, driven by escalating primary and high school fees, undermines the not-for-profit mandate of educational institutions registered as charitable entities. The Supreme Court's ruling in Unnikrishnan v. State of Andhra Pradesh (1993) prohibits profiteering. Yet, T.M.A. Pai v. State of Karnataka (2002) allows a "reasonable surplus" for growth—a loophole exploited due to its vague definition. Private tuition fees have surged at 10% annually between 2012 and 2020, far exceeding the 5–6% CPI inflation rate. This surge is fueled by high demand for quality education, limited supply, and rising operational costs like infrastructure, technology, and teacher salaries. Regulatory gaps permit fee hikes masked as "development," while parents' willingness to pay premiums for perceived quality and inadequate public school alternatives amplify the trend. This market-like dynamic—where fees reflect demand and cost pressures rather than mere cost recovery—strains families, deepening inequality as education grows less affordable.

Despite the charitable framework, schools reinvest surpluses, blurring the line between non-profit intent and profit-driven behavior. Mitigating this requires tighter oversight, clearer fee regulations, and a bolstered public education system to reduce dependence on expensive private options, ensuring education remains accessible rather than a privilege for the affluent.

Access to quality education is a fundamental human right that much of India's population currently lacks. Hence, it is up to the future voices, voters, and lawmakers to create change for the betterment of Indian society. A strong social movement is what we need to regain justice and equality for all.






Exploring Colour to Express & Create- An Activity by Grade 5


The PYP Exhibition 2025 **Ecolibrium** was a remarkable journey of inquiry, action, and reflection for our Grade 5 learners. As the culmination of their IB Primary Years Programmed learning, learners explored real-world issues and opportunities with passion and dedication.

Throughout the process, they embodied the IB elements, using Specified and Additional Concepts to frame their inquiries, applying Approaches to

Learning (ATL) skills to research and collaborate, and demonstrating the Learner Profile Attributes in their work. Many learners reflected on their growth—few of them shared how they became Risk-Takers while interviewing experts, others highlighted how Research Skills helped them see different perspectives, and many found purpose in Taking Action through spreading awareness through videos, posters and websites on issues & opportunities highlighting sustainable solutions.







Environmentally Friendly Prototype

Every year, millions of people suffer from the emission of poisonous gases. The lives of hundreds are lost in widespread fires, major gas leaks, and poisonous gases running through the air we breathe. This was a fact that had devastated me internally. I couldn't live peacefully...

Technology is rapidly advancing, smartphones are becoming more intelligent year by year, and AI is proving to take a big leap ahead, so why are injuries due to fires and gas leaks still on the rise, and why are effective gas leakage systems still not installed in rural and remote areas?

ROBP-133 has been designed for this very reason; it is a modern supermachine with the ability to identify the presence of harmful and toxic gases in the atmosphere. The system is based on an Arduino UNO board and consists of an LCD, DC motors, and an MQ-2 sensor.

The device is designed to move around or through a large area of land, identifying harmful and poisonous gases present in the atmosphere. The system can identify these gases and alert surrounding individuals, as well as call for emergency assistance, saving lives.

The system works by mapping out an area of land, or in this case, a rural village, which consists of 6 wheels allowing it to pass through the harsh and rocky paths present in a small town. The motor uses a wheel-lock mechanism, allowing it to move 4 of the 6 wheels using just 2 DC motors attached to a 9-volt power cell. Its battery life can vary based on the size of the battery, but it can last around a week with a 4000 mAh Lithium-Ion power cell.

The system currently uses wifi to connect to the home base, but in the future, this can connect to satellites and can even contain a solar panel, allowing it to recharge while on the go. The prototype currently contains just one MQ-2 gas sensor, and a single Ultrasonic sensor but with a little more budget can contain even more sensors with the ability to identify very specific gases in great detail and have a greater object detection system.

This device can allow for greater safety measures in small villages and remote rural towns on a budget.

This is my version of a beginning to an evolved and safer world, saving the lives of millions.

Hope.


After years of accepting decay, of believing in the inevitability of loops and code and monotony, this rude, chaotic boy had left her with something new.

Statistics show that 15 million trees are lost every year in the name of development.


